#### Titanic Remembrance Day by Andrew Dotter

"I'm king of the world!" You know these words, you can picture Leonardo DiCaprio standing at the bow of the ship his arms outstretched, but this shouldn't overshadow the real-life tragedy that was the TITANIC. This month sees the 102<sup>nd</sup> anniversary of the sinking of the RMS *Titanic* While making her maiden voyage across the Atlantic, tragedy struck when she collided with an iceberg. Sinking quickly, she took 1,502 of the 2,224 passengers and crew to their watery graves. Many died from either drowning or frostbite in one of the deadliest peacetime maritime disasters in modern history. The news soon reached all the corners of the world, where it was greeted with shock and left many wondering how such a marvelously luxurious unsinkable ship could sink. Like all modern disasters, we must never forget these events and the pain they caused. But its legacy is more than that. The disaster caused major improvements in maritime safety. One of their most important legacies was the establishment in 1914 of the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea (SOLAS), which still governs maritime safety today. Additionally, several new wireless regulations were passed around the world in an effort to learn from the many missteps in wireless communications. Out of tragedy came safety. This is why we remember, and on April 15<sup>th</sup> Titanic Remembrance Day is held annually. So maybe no other band will have to play "Nearer MY God the Thee" as they wait to die.

#### National Autism Awareness Month

In order to highlight the growing need for concern and awareness about autism, the Autism Society has been celebrating National Autism Awareness Month since the 1970s. The United States recognizes April as a special opportunity to while about autism and increase within the autism community.

The Autism Awareness Ribbon — The puzzle pattern reflects the mystery and complexity of the autism spectrum. The different colors and shapes represent the diversity of the people and families living with the condition. The brightness of the ribbon signals hope — hope that through increased awareness of autism, and through early intervention and appropriate treatments, people with autism will lead fuller, more complete lives

Many people with autism have hypersensitive senses, and in chaotic or unfamiliar situations (like a school hallway, pep rally, or concert) they can be flooded with too much sensory stimuli and have a meltdown. This situation is called sensory overload, and this is what it feels like:

The sunlight crowds out your vision and burns your retinas. Your eyes ache with the strain. For a second everything is overexposed. Then your eyes adjust and you see a blur of strangers, colors, buildings, and sky, everything shouting for your attention. The chaos is blinding and you are forced to squint even though your eyes have adjusted to the light. Meanwhile, the casual chatter of hundreds of conversations builds up to an incessant roar that nearly drowns out your own thoughts. Trying to tune all this out is like trying to close an overstuffed suitcase, and you just don't have the energy today. A group of kids barge past you and you force yourself not to shudder at their arms brushing yours. "Sorry," is the first thing you can think of to say, even though it was them who bumped into you. You clutch the strap of your backpack. At least that is familiar. You know you have to act like this doesn't bother you. The last thing you want is to attract attention to yourself. You've dealt with that enough at school.

You focus on the least chaotic thing you can find: the backpack strap. You are well aware that you are acting strange; darting your eyes, walking oddly, but you are beyond caring at this point. You need to find a quiet place fast. The sun is heating the air to an intolerable temperature. The drone of voices rises and falls and your ears feel full. You feel all eyes on you. You are a sardine in a can, a fish out of water. You are drained. Your heart hammers in your chest and your palms sweat. All you want to do is get out of here before you freak out. Panic rises in your chest as you realize that you no longer have any idea where "here" is.

Your mother laughs when you confess all this to her. "It's all in your head, honey," she says, which only adds to your frustration and panic. Because what she said is true, but that doesn't mean sensory overload is imaginary.

Next time you see someone exhibiting this behavior, be kind, after all we all have our quirks. Normal is boring! But then what is normal?

### **Easy Eating**

#### Cooking Tips for the Culinary-Challenged Student

#### Easy egg salad recipe:

8 eggs
½ cup mayonnaise
I teaspoon yellow mustard (Optional)
¼ cup chopped green onion or celery
salt and pepper to taste
¼ teaspoon paprika



With so many left-over eggs from Easter, you're probably wondering how you could possibly eat them all before they spoil. This month's installment of Easy Eating will be focusing on eggs!

First to boil the eggs- Place the eggs in a saucepan and cover with cold water. Bring water to a boil and immediately remove from heat. Cover and let eggs stand in hot water for 10 to 12 minutes. Remove from hot water, cool, peel and chop.(warning: the fresher the eggs, the harder they are to peel)

To make the egg salad, place the chopped eggs in a bowl, and stir in the mayonnaise, mustard and green onion(or celery). Season with salt, pepper and paprika and stir thoroughly and serve as a sandwich or on crackers. You can always tweak the recipe to your preference.

Good luck with this easy recipe, and I hope you'll be able to make some egg-cellent sandwiches with it!

## Earth Day by Robert Devigili

Each year, Earth Day -- April 22 -- marks the anniversary of what many consider the birth of the modern environmental movement in 1970.

"The height of hippie and flower-child culture in the United States, 1970 brought the death of Jimi Hendrix, the last Beatles album, and Simon & Garfunkel's "Bridge over Troubled Water". Protest was the order of the day, but saving the planet was not the cause. War raged in Vietnam, and students nationwide increasingly opposed it. At the time, Americans were slurping leaded gas through massive V8 sedans. Industry belched out smoke and sludge with little fear of legal consequences or bad press. Air pollution was commonly accepted as the smell of prosperity. "Environment" was a word that appeared more often in spelling bees than on the evening news. Although mainstream America remained oblivious to environmental concerns, the stage had been set for change by the publication of Rachel Carson's New York Times bestseller Silent Spring in 1962. The book represented a watershed moment for the modern environmental movement, selling more than 500,000 copies in 24 countries and, up until that moment, more than any other person, Ms. Carson raised public awareness and concern for living organisms, the environment and public health. Earth Day 1970 capitalized on the emerging consciousness, channeling the energy of the anti-war protest movement and putting environmental concerns front and center. The 2014 Earth Day theme was "Green Cities." This title was generously met, with 192 countries participating in mass scales to improve the environmental conditions of their cities and population. This includes rallies and festivals, demonstrations; mass clean ups and tree plantings, and fundraisers to make building "greener." In particular, Columbus, Ohio, organized thousands of people to completely clean up the cities' trash. On a more global scale, several countries, such as India and Albania, are demanding more renewable resources and greener cities. It is civilian concern that makes Earth Day 2014 a success. Individual actions are what will change the world, so let's keep the movement going!
