After 30 years of coaching baseball at Marian, Head Coach Jeff Nietz has decided to retire. After serving as an assistant coach to Charlie "Chink" Connely for 10 years, Nietz took over the Head Coaching duties in 1994. In his 20 year tenure, he compiled a 275-154 record while his teams went to the District XI Championship in twice, winning in 2000 & won nine Schuylkill League Division Titles. "For the past 20 years I've been blessed with great kids and great coaches - the success I've had is because of them!" reflected Nietz; "The support from the Marian Community - the Administration, Teachers, Men of Marian and the parents has been outstanding!" A true highlight for him is not the hundreds of wins nor championships - but his contributions to the personal development of the hundreds of young men he coached throughout the years. In addition, he is quick to point out that his family has been a huge part of his success in the program. Coaching his sons Scott & Frank on the team as well as having daughter Lauren working as his manager/scorekeeper and wife, Rita Nietz serving as a Booster Club Officer throughout the years has kept everything in perspective for him. He stated, "at the end of the day or the conclusion of a season, it's all about your family buying into and being a part of what you love to do - it makes that activity one-hundred percent more enjoyable. To have had my family by my side, it made the wins better and helped ease the pain of a loss easier." In a fitting conclusion to his career, Nietz was recently informed he will be inducted into the Marian Hall of Fame this coming year.
