ASVAB stand for Armed Services Vocational

Aptitude Battery. It is a series of tests by the department of defense and is used by the U.S. Army to determine whether you have the right attitude to enlist. It also helps determine which military occupational specialty you qualify for just in case you are drafted. It gives you a great look at what your weaknesses are and where you are strongest. The ASVAB test is broken down in many different test areas. It is broken down to General science, Arithmetic reasoning, Word knowledge, Paragraph Comprehension, Mathematics knowledge, electronics information, Auto and Shop information, Mechanical comprehension, and assembling objects. The AFQT score is the most important part when it comes to the ASVAB Test. It is scored into 10 other composite score areas known as Line Scores. Armed forces qualification test, Clerical, combat, Electronics, Field artillery, General Maintenance, General Technical, Mechanical maintenance, Operators and food, Surveillance and communications, and Skilled Technical. All of these are parts of the ASVAB affect the AFQT and each of the ten lines. All together to finally enlist into the Army you need to score at least a 31. All seniors at Marian took this test on October 14.
