Introduce your students and their families to stories from around the world. Let them know about the <u>International Children's Digital Library</u> (http://en.childrenslibrary.org/index.shtml), an amazing (and growing!) collection of international children's books available to read online in their original languages. <u>Big Universe (http://www.biguniverse.com/)</u> is another online library of fiction and nonfiction books for kids 0-12. The site also offers adults and kids the chance to create and publish their own stories.

Suggest audio books as an alternative to print, especially for kids with learning disabilities that make reading a struggle. You can now download stories to iPods and other mobile devices, perfect for car rides or a lazy hot afternoon. AudibleKids has an extensive collection of **downloadable books** (http://kids.audible.com/), and some of them are free through a partnership with RIF.

For students with vision or learning disabilities, tell your parents about <u>Learning</u> <u>Ally (http://www.learningally.org/)</u> (formerly Recording for the Blind and Dyslexic), which provides free audio books for kids to listen over the summer.
