Word Parts: Base Words, **Prefixes, Suffixes, and Roots**

ACADEMIC VOCABULARY

base word: complete word that can stand alone

root: word part that contains the core meaning of a word

prefix: word part added to the beginning of a root or base word

suffix: word part added to the end of a root or base word

HERE'S HOW

Step 1: Distinguish between a base word and a root. Remember that a base word is meaningful alone while a root needs prefixes or suffixes to make sense.

EXAMPLE Base Word: sense Root: -ject-

Step 2: Add word parts to a base word or root to create a new word.

EXAMPLE

Prefix		Root / Base		Suffix		New Word
non-	+	sense			=	nonsense
		sense	+	-less	=	senseless
pro-		-ject-	+	-or	=	projector
inter-	+	-ject-	+	-ion	=	interjection

Step 3: Expand your vocabulary by learning prefixes and suffixes. Notice that suffixes often determine a word's part of speech.
